Jonah 3:1-5, 10 and Gospel Mark1: 14-20

Reflection: The conversion of Nineveh (Jonah 3: 1-5, 10)





The book of Jonah was written when the nation of Israel was trying to come to terms with what they had been through during their period in exile. Their understanding was developing and shifting, letting go of ancient structures that had been ripped away and identifying God's call to new patterns of worship – different ways of declaring identity and it represents a commitment to engage with facing change.

Question: How do we respond when someone presents an idea that we might find threatening? These remain big question in the church and in any other organisation that attaches great respect to tradition. This sort of mentality may prevent us from seeing or accepting that despite man's ingenuity for orderliness, yet God's ways are different from our ways and His time is different from our time.

Message: Let us we pray for the grace to be able and willing to change our minds, to alter our stance for the good of humanity. We can hold on fast/hard that we cannot begin to understand or tolerate new ideas, changes or 'fresh blood'. Like Jonah's anger showed how his fixed ideas were profoundly challenged by the people's turn around. This is a message God's time for a change will come upon us. It may be a change of heart, our ways of living, or relationships, letting go of hurt/betrayal, the world during and after a pandemic.

God changes His mind about the fate of Nineveh. **Question? Does this affect our notion of God's constancy?**


The epiphany I got from this is that indeed the promises of God are sure for every one of us but often the issue lies with us. *(EXODUS 3: 14-15: The Lord is faithful to his covenant promises and delivers his people through his powerful right hand).*

To date, the Jews rely on this message from Jonah's encounter with God and it is meditated on and studied during Yom Kippur – festival of cleansing which is especially important in Jewish faith – a time of cleansing of the soul, repenting and starting afresh.

I pray that when the tide of change comes our way, we do not become stubborn or sulk like Jonah or waste precious time – so that we may have sufficient time to experience the promises and love of God in all that we do knowing that no matter what may come our way – our lives are in His hands.

The Gospel Mark1: 14-20 (Jesus Calling Hs Disciples to Follow Him: "I will make you fishers of men")







Timing is everything! We must be alert and responsive to the Lord's calling. After the imprisonment of John the Baptist, Jesus went to Galilee preaching the gospel of the Kingdom of God. He saw Simon and Andrew casting their nets and He called them "come after me and I will make you fishers of men". And straightaway they forsook their nets and followed Jesus. And the same for James and John who also immediately left their father's fishing business and followed Jesus. Here began the ministry of Jesus. His message of urgency – repent for the kingdom of God is at hand and the urgency which His first disciples responded to their calling.

Question:

- What do you feel about the idea that you are chosen by Jesus?
- What is it about Jesus that would make you want to say, 'yes'?
- What might make you hesitate in your response to Jesus?

The disciples were in their daily routine when Jesus came and called to them. With so much to do, and pressure from others to complete work and make money, it would have been easy for them to have ignored him.

Message:

Let us together reflect on where in our daily routine is Jesus speaking to us. Perhaps we are missing his voice as we struggle to complete all that is expected of us by family, colleagues and friends?

Jesus Christ is talking to us now through the scriptures, hymns and prayers but more so, through each of us. If we were to hear him, what would we expect him to say?

Would we be willing to change what we are doing if he asks us to? Jesus Christ is calling us to be 'fishers of men'. We cannot use fishing nets to catch people, but we can capture their hearts by being true disciples through evangelising the 'Good News', our support for those less privilege, being a voice for those on the margins of society.

The pandemic has forced us to be exactly just that – we are taking the Church with us as we go along. We are witnessing the number of services people can 'attend' on-line and via Zoom; others are able to be part of a fellowship group in another country, etc.

Finally, God always has a plan whether the change is through pain and suffering or through Joy, God's will always bring liberation, restoration and renewed hope. I pray when the tide of change comes our way, we do not become stubborn or sulk like Jonah or waste precious time – so that we may have sufficient time to experience the promises and love of God in all that we do knowing that no matter what may come our way – our lives are in His hands. **Amen.**
